### Applicability

- Most of the BIL requirements are based on the size of the Urbanized Areas (UZAs) that transit agencies serve
  - Changes to PTASP requirements for transit agencies serving a UZAs with a population of 200,000 or fewer
    - PTASP changes, frontline involvement
  - Changes to PTASP requirements for transit agencies that receive Section 5307 funding and serve UZAs with a population of 200,000 or more
    - All of above and risk reduction; funding use; de-escalation training; maintenance training; <u>Safety Committee requirement</u>

#### Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill Overview

- For all agencies:
  - Exposure to infectious diseases: ASP shall be consistent with Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and/or State health agency (applicable to all agencies)
  - 2. Frontline personnel involvement: Agencies must develop its ASP in cooperation with frontline employee representatives (applicable to all agencies)
- For agencies serving over 200,000 in UZA:
  - 1. Safety Committee: Must establish a Safety Committee by July 31, 2022

#### Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill Overview

#### For agencies serving over 200,000 in UZA:

- 1. A risk reduction program to reduce the number and rates of accidents, injuries, and **assaults on transit workers**
- A risk reduction program to reduce vehicular and pedestrian accidents involving buses
- Risk reduction performance targets using data submitted to the National Transit Database
- 4. A comprehensive safety training program for operations and <u>maintenance</u> staff that must include <u>de-escalation training</u>
- 5. Ensure that at least 0.75% of section 5307 funds are used for safety purposes

#### Safety Committee Requirements

For agencies serving over 200,000 in UZA:

July 31, 2022

Transit agency establishes its Safety Committee



Safety Committee approves transit agency ASP that is compliant with new BIL PTASP requirements

#### Forming a Safety Committee

- For agencies serving over 200,000 in UZA:
  - The Safety Committee <u>must</u>:
    - 1. Have an equal number of <u>frontline employee representatives</u> and management representatives
    - 2. Be convened using a joint labor-management process
  - Representatives of frontline transit workers employed by the transit agency must be selected by a labor organization representing the majority of its frontline workforce
    - If not represented by labor organizations, the agency should determine a method to select frontline representatives
  - If Safety Committee exists, it must meet the BIL requirements; OR
    - A transit agency may choose to follow existing collective bargaining process to establish and operate its Safety Committee

#### Safety Committee Responsibilities

- The Safety Committee will be responsible for:
  - Identifying and recommending risk-based mitigations and/or strategies needed to reduce the likelihood and severity of hazards identified by the transit agency's safety risk assessment;
  - Identifying mitigations and/or strategies that may be inappropriate or ineffective; and
  - Identifying safety deficiencies for continuous improvement.
